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Language Learning And Behavior Disorders

There are 2 kinds of language disorders: receptive and expressive. Children often have both at the same time. A child with a receptive language disorder has trouble understanding words that they hear and read. A child with an expressive language disorder has trouble speaking with others and expressing thoughts and feelings.

A child with a learning disorder in nonverbal skills appears to develop good basic language skills and strong rote memorization skills early in childhood. Difficulties are present in visual-spatial skills, visual-motor skills, and other skills necessary in social or academic functioning.

The relationship between early language delays and later learning and social-behavioral disorders is clearly not linear, and additional prospective studies should help to clarify this issue. Retrospective studies that carefully review the early development of students who in the elementary schools exhibit learning problems may identify communication markers that predict later learning patterns.

A third area where learning disabilities and behavioral problems coexist is with social behaviour. Often children with learning disabilities have problems with familial and peer relationships. This may be the result of processing problems which make it difficult for LD children to pick up social cues. This in turn may result in avoidance behaviour.
