Role Play Therapy in Addiction Treatment. Role-playing is an excellent way to gain valuable insight into all parties and sides of a given situation. It allows participants to gain more confidence in themselves while simultaneously becoming more aware of the feelings and thoughts of those around them.

Tool 1. Scenarios Guide ... requested that the substance abuse information be sent by the treatment facility. ... Lesson 4 - Scenarios - Role Play - Alcohol Education Program

The first group role-playing exercise involves decision making. In one big group, discuss decisions that seem unimportant. Have each group member share about a decision that did not seem like a big deal but ended up leading to a relapse. For instance, a decision to hang out with a friend who ended up at a party with alcohol.

Role playing is a game that lets a person see himself through the actions of someone else. The scenarios used for role play can be any negative situation that an individual would experience with another person while they were actively using drugs.

In this study, it was tried to develop young people's self-efficacy against substance use with Role-Playing Scenarios (RPS). In this way, it was aimed to teach young people effective, fast, critical, and empathic ways of thinking with RPS for protection from substance usage.

Effects of Role-Playing Scenarios on the Self-efficacy of ...

Role-playing activities give group members the chance to act out potential real-life scenarios. The activity gives them practice in what to do when

such situations arise. One such role-playing exercise has one group member play the person in recovery and another play a friend who is trying to persuade the other person to gamble, drink or use drugs.

Ten Most Common High-Risk Situations for Ex-Addicts. Being around people, places, and situations previously associated with your drug and/or alcohol use. Substituting any other mood or mind-altering substances other than “drug of choice.”. Feeling bored, lonely, angry, horny or tired and dwelling on past mistakes.

10 Most Common High Risk Situations for Ex-Addicts

- Role playing – two areas that social workers have identified as needing more support around are a) how to ask and talk about substance use and b) how to respond if people deny or minimise their problem. Role plays help people to explore what works and doesn't in terms of skills and how to ask the right questions in the right way.
